## Community Worship with gifted Pastor Ron Vietti

On Sunday, August 3, at 10 a.m. a variety of local churches (Calvary Chapel, Centered in Christ, Crossway Bible Church, Frazier Mountain Community Church, Frazier Park Vineyard, Greater Mountain Pentecostals, Home Church of Frazier Park, Pine Mountain Christian Community Church, South Kern Christian Church) had invited their members and the public to attend the first “Worship in the Park” at the Fiesta Days. Despite pouring rain, more than 300 people showed up.

The service started with a variety of modern worship songs played by an amazing ensemble of seven musicians from local churches (from Calvary Chapel: *Ann* on guitar and vocals, *Lorrie* on vocals and *Michael* on drums; from Vineyard Christian Fellowship: *Mark* on guitar; from Frazier Mountain Community Church: *Sherri* on Vocals; from Shepard of the Mountains Lutheran Church: *Walt* on guitar and vocals and *Pam* on Bass).

Afterwards Pastor *Ron Vietti* from Valley Bible Fellowship in Bakersfield delivered his message. He talked about happiness, failures and success in life which are not the result of what we have, but rather of how we live and whether we have faith in God.

Pastor *Ron* included a variety of personal stories and experiences from his own life, the good, the funny, and the bad. He described situations everyone can relate to and apply in life. Speaking from his heart he says God shows up every time. His unconventional and candid worship style seemed to reach the hearts and minds of everyone in the audience.

## Tejon Fire at the Grapevine



On Monday, August 4, 2014 at 9:20 a.m. two spot fires were reported at the west side of the Southbound Interstate 5, about 1.5 miles north of the Fort Tejon exit. Kern County Fire Department (KCFD) dispatched ground crews (including 4 engines and 4 patrols, 1 water tender, 2 bulldozers, 2 fire crews, and 3 additional units with a total of 75 personnel) and air units (1 water dropping helicopter (407), and 2 airtankers). Units from the BLM (Bureau for Land Management), Los Padres National Forest, and CHP came to assist in the response. Upon arrival, one spot fire was contained to 50 x 100 ft. A second spot fire moved slowly up the hill, and, due to the very light vegetation with only grass and dirt, was stopped half-way up. Aggressive attack by firefighters using hose lays and the support from air tankers and the helicopter also kept the fire from growing in size. Hand crews and Dozers were requested and created containment lines to stop the progression of the fire.

As determined by the KCFD about 60 acres burned, but houses along Digier Canyon (just north of historic Fort Tejon) were not threatened, and the southbound Interstate 5 was opened all the time.

The fire was for the most part contained within an hour.

## California State Parks intends to buy the land surrounding the Frazier Mountain High School (FMHS) – Presentation to the School Board of Trustees

On Thursday, July 31, 2014 the California State Parks' Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation (OHMVR) Division made a presentation at the School Board meeting. The Hungry Valley State Vehicular Recreation Area intends to purchase the approximately 845 acres of land surrounding the Frazier Mountain High School (FMHS). The Chair of the OHMVR Commission, *Paul Slavik*, the Planning Manager, *Dan Canfield*, and explained the process and the potential benefits for the High School.

The proposed acquisition includes land within Kern County that stretches from Frazier Mountain Park Road southwards to the existing Hungry Valley SVRA. To the west it is bordered by Los Padres National Forest and to the east again the Hungry Valley SVRA. At this point in time no changes in the current land use are planned. Until plans for that area can be developed and implemented, the property would be closed to the public, and Park Rangers would patrol the area to preclude trespass, vandalism, and other undesired activities. Possible future land use changes would be investigated as part of the Hungry Valley SVRA General Plan Update / Environmental Impact Report, tentatively scheduled for 2015. Those future land uses may include campgrounds, Off-Highway Vehicle safety training center, Off-Highway Vehicle recreation, non-motorized recreation (e.g., hiking, wildlife viewing, mountain biking), or natural/cultural resource conservation.

The final decision about the purchase will, after a variety of public hearings, be made by the California Public Works Board. One of those public hearings required by law (Public Resources Code) took place on June 25, 2014 at the Frazier Park Library.

## **New –temporary- School Board Member Appointed: *Barbara Newbold***

School Board member Scott Robinson had resigned from the Board of Trustees for the El Tejon Unified School District in early summer. The remaining four board members decided to fill that vacancy via appointment until November of 2014. Four local residents answered the call for service: *Barbara Newbold*, *Misty Harris-Johnston*, *Sabrina Rouser*, and *Steve Berry*. All four appeared at the school board meeting on Thursday, July 31, 2014. Each of the four candidates had to respond in public a question asked by each of the four Board Members:

- What skills and abilities do you have that would make you an effective Board member?
- What experience do you have that qualifies you to be a Board member?
- Is the community more important to the school district or is the school district more important to the community?
- Why do you want to serve on the Board of Trustees? (i.e., what are your skills and experiences for becoming a school board member).

All four candidates gave excellent presentation and all came across as being sincerely committed. Two of them (*Barbara Newbold* and *Misty Harris-Johnston*) emphasized their previous working experience in public and private schools. Another candidate, *Steve Berry*, has currently children and grandchildren attending the Elementary School and his daughter *Alli* graduated from FMHS this summer. He highlighted the important role of the community for the school district and the need for community representation in the district's decision making process.

In the end three of the four board members (*Vickie Mullen*, *Lark Shillig*, *John Fleming*) voted to appoint

*Barbara Newbold* to that position. They stressed that *Barbara Newbold* has experience in working previously with the El Tejon Unified School District (ETUSD). That would make her the best fit for the temporary position until the election in November of 2014.

The appointment was effective immediately and minutes later *Barbara Newbold* was sworn into office by Superintendent *Rod Wallace*, and then joined the Board at the headtable with full voting rights.

Nevertheless, there are two openings (*Scott Robinson* has resigned and *Anita Anderson* will not run for another term after serving eight years on the board) for the school board available on the November 2014 ballot. Individuals interested to run in the upcoming election for a 4-year Board position must register with County Board of Elections in Bakersfield no later than August 8, 2014. This includes *Barbara Newbold* as well. If she wants to continue her service for the ETUSD after November 2014, she has to register and run for office in the upcoming election.

**NOTICE OF VACANCY AND PROVISIONAL APPOINTMENT  
TO THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE  
EL TEJON UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT**

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the vacancy has occurred on the Governing Board of the El Tejon Unified School District and that pursuant to Education Code section 5091, the Governing Board, at a board meeting on July 31, 2014, announced the provisional appointment of Barbara Newbold to serve on the Governing Board, replacing Scott Robinson, who resigned from the Governing Board effective July 17, 2014. This appointee will begin serving immediately upon appointment or as soon as the resignation is effective, whichever is earlier. Unless an election is ordered as explained below, the appointment will run until the next regularly scheduled district governing board election, whereupon an election shall be held to fill the vacancy for the remainder of the unexpired term.

The registered voters of the District may, within thirty (30) days after the appointment, petition for the conduct of a special election to fill the vacancy. A petition shall be deemed to bear a sufficient number of signatures if signed by at least the number of registered voters of the District equal to 1 ½ percent of the number of registered voters of the District at the time of the last regular election for governing board members, or 25 registered voters, whichever is greater. Such a petition shall be submitted to the County Superintendent of Schools Office, no later than 5:00 p.m. on the 30<sup>th</sup> day after the date of the appointment. For details concerning a petition, consult Education Code section 5091.

If such a petition is not submitted, Barbara Newbold will serve as a board member until the next regular governing board election.

If a petition is submitted and certified, the provisional appointment will be terminated and a special election will be held, within 120 days of the certification, to select a board member for the remainder of the unexpired term.

### **Mandatory Water Conservation Regulation Goes Into Effect (2)**

by the *California State Water Board*



On Tuesday, July 29, 2014, an emergency regulation to increase conservation practices for all Californians went into effect. The new conservation regulation targets outdoor urban water use. In some areas of the State, 50 percent or more of daily water use is for lawns and outdoor landscaping. This regulation establishes the minimum level of activity that residents, businesses and water suppliers must meet as the drought deepens and will be in effect for 270 days unless extended or repealed.



The regulation, adopted by the State Water Board July 15, and approved by the Office of Administrative Law July 28, mandates minimum actions to conserve water supplies both for this year and into 2015. For more information please visit the Conservation Regulation Portal.

With this regulation, all Californians are expected to stop: washing down driveways and sidewalks; watering of outdoor landscapes that cause excess runoff; using a hose to wash a motor vehicle, unless the hose is fitted with a shut-off nozzle, and using potable water in a fountain or decorative water feature, unless the water is recirculated. The regulation makes an exception for health and safety circumstances.

Larger water suppliers are required to activate their Water Shortage Contingency Plan to a level where outdoor irrigation restrictions are mandatory. In communities where no water shortage contingency plan exists, the regulation requires that water suppliers either limit outdoor irrigation to twice a week or implement other comparable conservation actions. Finally, large urban water suppliers must report water use on a monthly basis to track progress beginning Aug. 15.

Local agencies could ask courts to fine water users up to \$500 a day for failure to implement the conservation requirements of the regulation, in addition to their existing authorities and processes. Compliance with prohibitions and water agency restrictions on customer water use will be locally enforced. The State Water Board could initiate enforcement actions against water agencies that don't comply with the new regulations. Failure to comply with a State Water Board enforcement order by water agencies is subject to up to a \$10,000 a day penalty. ## Law Enforcement Corner



### Kern County Sheriff's Office (KCSO) – Frazier Park Substation

Sergeant Mark Brown from the Kern County Sheriff's Substation in Frazier Park released the following information about law enforcement related incidents and activities between **July 22 to 31:** \*

If you are a repeated offender you will be considered a threat to our Youth and risk to the community.**

#### Beware of Scams (2)

The Bakersfield Police Department has been receiving numerous calls regarding a variety of scams occurring in

the community. Typically when we warn the public of scams taking place they are limited to one type of scam or another, for example, a PG&E scam or Kern County Sheriff Department warrant scam. In this case we are advising numerous scams from multiple disciplines. We've received calls regarding IRS, PG&E, Jury Duty, Arrest Warrant, Grandparent, Pre-Paid Debit card, Lottery and many more types of scams.

What are some tips that you can use to protect yourself from being the victim of a scam?

- Do not provide unsolicited personal identifying information over the phone
- Do not send money based on a request made over the phone or on the internet
- Do not purchase a pre-paid debit card and give the information to a caller
- Do not act quickly, hang up the phone and verify
  - do your own research on the agency or institution the caller claims to be representing
  - do not rely on an internet site or telephone number provided by the caller
- Be aware of elderly adults' financial activities, the elderly are often prime victims of telephone scammers

The Bakersfield Police Department is reminding people that once they send a scammer money, their **MONEY WILL NOT BE RECOVERED!!!** So when entering into a financial agreement with an unsolicited caller or internet solicitation asking for money be prepared to simply give that money away.

## Cooking & Food



### Hot Beer Soup (heisse Biersuppe)

To serve 4 you will need

- 3 twelve-ounce bottles or cans of light beer
- ½ cup sugar
- 4 egg yolks
- 1/3 cup sour cream
- ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- Freshly ground pepper

Pour beer and sugar into a heavy 4- to 5-quart saucepan. Bring to a boil over high heat, stirring constantly until the sugar is resolved, then remove the pan from the heat. In a small bowl, beat the egg yolks with a wire whisk or fork to break them up, and beat in the sour cream a little at a time. Stir about ¼ cup of the hot beer into the mixture, and then whisk it into the beer. Add the cinnamon, salt and a few grindings of pepper. Return the pan to low heat

and cook, stirring constantly, until the soup thickens slightly.

Do not let it boil or it may curdle.

Taste for seasoning and serve at once from a heated tureen or in individual soup bowls.

### Potato Soup with Cucumber (Feine Kartoffelsuppe mit Gurken)

To serve 6 you will need

- 1 medium-sized or 2 small cucumbers
- 6 medium-sized boiling potatoes (about 1 ½ pounds), peeled and cut into ½-inch dice
- 3 cups cold water
- 1 ½ teaspoons salt
- ¼ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1 cup milk
- 1 tablespoon grated onion
- 1 tablespoon finely chopped fresh dill, or substitute 1 teaspoon dried dill weed

With a small, sharp knife, peel the cucumber and slice it lengthwise into halves. Scoop out the seed by running the tip of a teaspoon down the center of each half. Cut the cucumber into ¼-inch wide dice and set aside.

In a heavy 3- to 4-quart saucepan, bring the potatoes and water to a boil over high heat. Reduce the heat to moderate, add the salt and pepper, and cook uncovered until the potatoes are soft and can easily be mashed against the sides of the pan; then pour them and all the cooking liquid into a sieve set over a mixing bowl. With a large spoon forces the potatoes through the sieve. (If you prefer, purée the potatoes in a food mill. But don't

use a blender-it will make the mixture too smooth.) However if you have puréed the potatoes, return them and their liquid to the saucepan and stir in the cream, milk, grated onion, and cucumbers. Simmer over low heat for about 5 minutes, or until the cucumber is tender but still somewhat firm. Add the dill and taste for seasoning. Serve hot either from a heated tureen or in individual soup bowls.

### **Beans with Fruits and Vegetables (Westfälisches Blindhuhn)**

To serve 4 to 6

- 1 quart cold water
- 1 cup dried white beans, preferably Great Northern or navy beans
- ½ pound slab of lean bacon cut lengthwise into strips and crosswise into halves
- 1 ½ pounds cooking apples and 1 ½ pounds firm

ripe pears, peeled, cored and cut into ¼ - inch wedges, or use 3 pounds of cooking apples, peeled, cored, and cut into ¼ - inch wedges

- 1 pound fresh green string beans, trimmed, and cut into 2-inch lengths
- 1 cup coarsely diced scraped carrots
- 3 medium-sized boiling potatoes (about 1 pound), peeled and cut into ½ - inch dice
- Salt
- Freshly ground black pepper

In a heavy 4- to 6- quart saucepan or soup pot, bring 1 quart of water to a bubbling boil over high heat. Drop in the dried beans and boil uncovered for 2 minutes. Turn off the heat and let the beans soak for 1 hour.

Then add the bacon, return the beans to a boil, and reduce the heat to low. Partially cover the pan and simmer as slowly as possible for about 1 hour, or until the beans are barely tender.

Add the apples, pears, green beans, carrots, potatoes, salt to taste and a few grindings of pepper to the beans. Partially cover the pan and simmer, stirring occasionally, for 30 minutes longer, or until the vegetables and fruit are tender and the beans fully cooked. Taste for seasoning and serve hot from a deep heated bowl.

### **Throughout Kern County**

#### **Bakersfield - Fatal Shooting by Bakersfield Police Officer**

On Wednesday, August 6, 2014, at 12:28 pm, Bakersfield police officers were dispatched to the business at 2140 E. Brundage Ln. regarding a subject who was throwing gasoline on another subject at the business. At 12:32 pm, the first Bakersfield police officer arrived on-scene. A short time later the officer announced on the radio that he was involved in an officer involved shooting. Other officers began arriving on-scene and interviewing several witnesses. The suspect was transported Kern Medical Center by Hall Ambulance personnel.

Witnesses indicated that an adult male subject had been at the gas station for several hours before police were called. Witnesses said during that time the subject was behaving erratically which they described as throwing outdoor furniture, striking a nearby fence with a metal object, and yelling obscenities and screaming. At one point the suspect went to the area of the gas pumps where a woman was pumping gasoline into her vehicle that was occupied by her young children.

Witnesses said the suspect removed the gas nozzle from the fuel filler on the woman's vehicle and poured gasoline on the ground and on the woman's pants and attempted to ignite the gasoline with a lighter.

Shortly thereafter the officer arrived. Witnesses said the officer confronted the suspect who was armed with what some witnesses describe as a u-shaped bicycle lock and others describe as a black metal object and ordered the suspect to the ground. Witnesses said the suspect ignored the officer's commands and rapidly approached the officer. Witnesses said the officer fired one shot when the suspect was within five to ten feet of the officer. The suspect went to the ground and medical aid was summoned to the scene.

The suspect was transported to Kern Medical Center where he was pronounced deceased at 1:28 pm. No other people were injured as a result of the shooting or the suspect's actions. As is the case with all officer involved shootings, the officer was placed on paid administrative leave pending the outcome of the investigation.

#### **Bakersfield - Fatal Shooting by Kern County Sheriff's Deputies**

On Sunday, August 3, 2014 at 4:56 a.m. 42-year-old *Maria Victoria Rodriguez* of Bakersfield was shot to death at 1601 South Union Avenue in Bakersfield. A Kern County Sheriff's Deputy fired multiple shots at her after she reportedly pointed a gun at them. That weapon was later identified as a BB gun. She expired at the scene.

According to family members *Maria Rodriguez* was going home from a friend's house early Sunday morning when she took a shortcut through the area where she was killed. The victim was initially mistakenly identified by the Coroner's Division as 32-year-old *Sarah Bustamante*.

#### **Dustin Acres – Attempted Carjacking**

On Tuesday, July 29, at 2:56 pm, deputies from the Taft Substation responded to investigate a car-jacking that had occurred in the 27000-block of 119 Hwy in Dustin Acres. Through their investigation deputies learned a 29 year old Bakersfield resident agreed to give a female subject a ride from Bakersfield to a residence in the 27000-block of 119 Hwy in Dustin Acres. The female subject used a smart phone ride-sharing "app" to find the victim. After the victim dropped the female off at the residence, she made arrangements for the victim to give her a return ride to Bakersfield later in the afternoon. The victim arrived back at the residence around 2:30 pm and waited for the female to come outside. Instead, an unknown male (who was later identified as 22-year old Valley Acres resident Cesar Aguilar-Sanchez) entered the victim's front passenger seat. After a brief exchange of words the victim agreed to transport Aguilar-Sanchez and the female to Bakersfield. Before the victim started driving, Aguilar-Sanchez punched the victim multiple times in the face while demanding the victim give Aguilar-Sanchez the victim's car and cellular phone. The victim was able to remove the "smart key" from the vehicle and fled on foot. Aguilar-Sanchez chased after the victim until the victim started flagging down vehicles driving by. The victim was able to return to his vehicle, flee the area, and contact law enforcement. Deputies returned to the area in Dustin Acres to continue their investigation. A records check of Aguilar-Sanchez revealed he had an active felony parole warrant and was

recently featured on Taft's Most Wanted. Deputies located and arrest Aguilar-Sanchez for car-jacking, second degree robbery, and for violating parole. Aguilar-Sanchez was transported and booked into the Central Receiving Facility Jail.

### **Wasco – Narcotics & Weapons Arrest**

On Thursday, July 31, 2014 at approximately 3 p.m. a Senior Deputy assigned to the Wasco Substation observed a vehicle with expired registration being driven on 7th Street in Wasco. The driver, who was later identified as *Alfonso Trujillo*, quickly turned into a market parking lot without using his blinker. The Senior Deputy conducted a traffic stop and determined *Trujillo* did not have a valid license. *Trujillo* attempted to resist arrest by trying to flee on foot. A struggle ensued and during the struggle *Trujillo* continued to reach for his waistband. Additional deputies arrived to assist and *Trujillo* was taken into custody. After *Trujillo* was in custody it was determined he had been armed with a loaded 40 caliber semi-automatic handgun (with the serial number removed) which was in his waistband. A search of *Trujillo* and his belongings yielded approximately 142 grams (approx. 5oz) of methamphetamine, paraphernalia, packaging materials, scales, and over \$1,700.00 in US currency. The methamphetamine had an approximate street value of \$8,500.00. *Trujillo* was arrested and booked into the Central Receiving Facility for H.S. 11377(a) possession of methamphetamine, H.S. 11378 possession for sales, H.S. 11379 transportation for sales, H.S. 11370.1(a) possession of firearm w/narcotics, H.S. 11364.1(a) paraphernalia, PC 25400(a)(1) carrying a concealed weapon, PC 148(a)(1) resist or delaying an officer, VC 12500(a) No valid license, VC16028(a) no proof of insurance, and PC 537(e) firearm with the serial # removed.

### **Bakersfield – Four Narcotics Arrests**

On Wednesday, July 30, 2014 at approximately 7:45 p.m., deputies from the Kern County Sheriff's Office Gang Suppression Section went to 811 Skyline Ave in Bakersfield to conduct a probation compliance check of 43 year old *Ruben Chavez*. Once at the residence, deputies contacted Chavez and found him to be in possession of methamphetamine. Also at the residence,

deputies contacted 41 year old *Jose Magana*, 41 year old *James Roybal*, 25 year old *Marissa Tibbals* and 22 year old *Adriana Lopez*. Deputies searched the subjects, who were all on varying probationary status and the residence and located over 20 grams of methamphetamine and paraphernalia associated with the sale of controlled substances. *Magana* was arrested for possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of sale and the attempted destruction of evidence, *Chavez* was arrested for possession of a controlled substance and drug paraphernalia, *Tibbals* was arrested for possession of a controlled substance and 4 arrest warrants, *Roybal* was arrested on an active parole warrant and *Lopez* was arrested on an active felony warrant. All subjects were booked into the Central Receiving Facility.

## **California Department of Public Health (CDPH) Reports First Human West Nile Virus Fatalities This Summer**

The first two deaths this summer due to West Nile virus infection have been confirmed by the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) it was announced on Wednesday, August 6, 2014 by Dr. Ron Chapman, CDPH Director and state public health officer. The first was a senior citizen from Sacramento County. The second was an adult from Shasta County.

"These unfortunate deaths remind us that we must protect ourselves from mosquito bites to prevent West Nile virus and other mosquito born infections," said

Chapman. "West Nile virus activity is greatest during the summertime."

West Nile virus is transmitted to humans and animals by the bite of an infected mosquito. The risk of serious illness to most people is low. However, some individuals – less than one percent – can develop a serious neurologic illness such as encephalitis or meningitis. People 50 years of age and older have a higher chance of getting sick and are more likely to develop complications. Recent data also indicate that those with diabetes and/or hypertension are at greatest risk for serious illness.

To date in 2014, West Nile virus has been detected in 36 California counties.

CDPH recommends that individuals prevent exposure to mosquito bites and West Nile virus by practicing the "Three Ds:"

- DEET – Apply insect repellent containing DEET, picaradin, oil of lemon eucalyptus or IR3535



according to label instructions. Repellents keep the mosquitoes from biting you. DEET can be used safely on infants and children 2 months of age and older.

- **DAWN AND DUSK** – Mosquitoes bite in the early morning and evening so it is important to wear proper clothing and repellent if outside during these times. Make sure that your doors and windows have tight-fitting screens to keep out mosquitoes. Repair or replace screens with tears or holes.
- **DRAIN** – Mosquitoes lay their eggs on standing water. Eliminate all sources of standing water on your property, including flower pots, old car tires, rain gutters and pet bowls. If you know of a swimming pool that is not being properly maintained, please contact your local mosquito and vector control agency.
