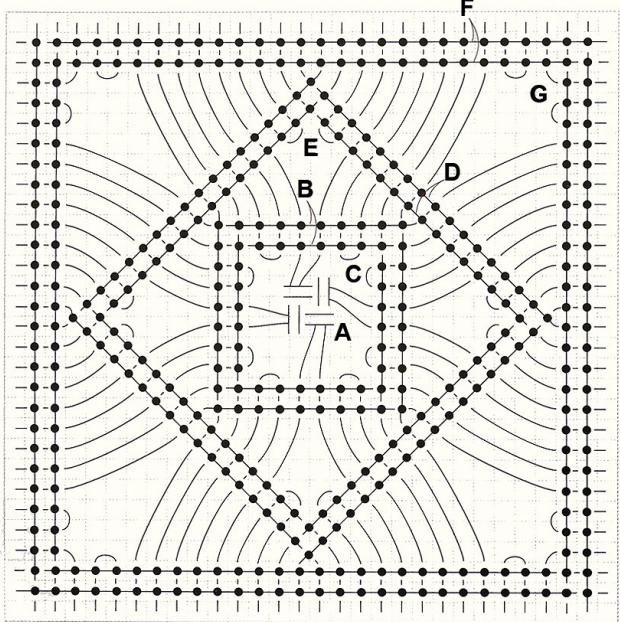




**Square-Within-Square**

**Knotting Diagram**



Begin with a single 4-ply Round Lanyard Knot at the center of the piece; then work out, adding filler cords and working cords along the way.

Horizontal Clove Hitch

for soft jute cord (2mm)

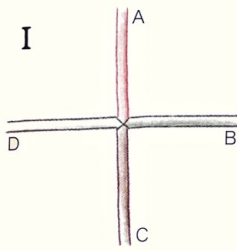
	Location	*Length (each)	Cords needed
<b>A</b>	Center knot	28"/70cm	<b>4</b>
<b>B</b>	Row 1 filler cords	28"/70cm	<b>8</b>
<b>C</b>	Row 1 vertical cords	28"/70cm	<b>8</b>
<b>D</b>	Row 2 filler cords	22"/55cm	<b>8</b>
<b>E</b>	Row 2 vertical cords	20"/50cm	<b>8</b>
<b>F</b>	Row 3 filler cords	14"/35cm	<b>8</b>
<b>G</b>	Row 3 vertical cords	14"/35cm	<b>12</b>

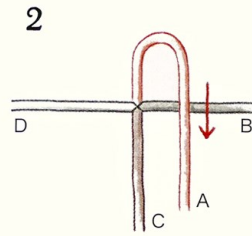


## 4-ply Round Lanyard

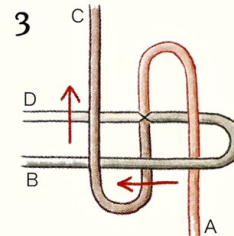
In this technique, 4 cords are overlapped in sequence to create a parallel cross pattern. The direction of the overlap is consistent and forms a diagonal pattern on the rope surface.



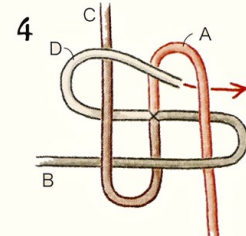
Begin with 4 cords, each 4–5 times the desired length of the finished piece; arrange them end-to-end to form a cross as shown. (Or overlap 2 cords, each 10 times the finished length.)



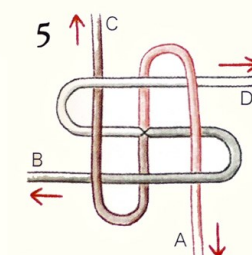
Fold cord A over cord B.



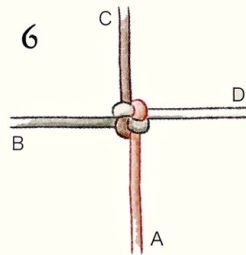
Fold cord B over cord C, and cord C over cords B and D.



Fold cord D over cord C and then through the loop created by cord A.

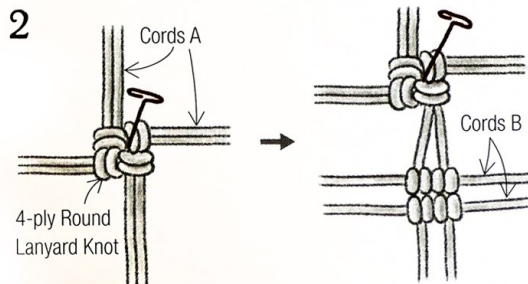


One at a time, gently pull the end of each cord to tighten the knot.

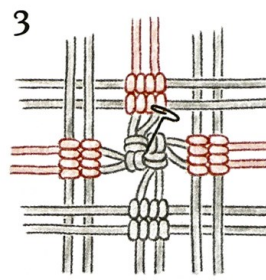


One knot of the 4-ply Round Lanyard is complete.

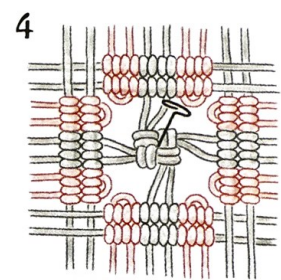
**I** The sample in the photo is made of jute cord and measures 4"/10cm square. The length of cord required will vary with its weight, but the table above can be a guide.



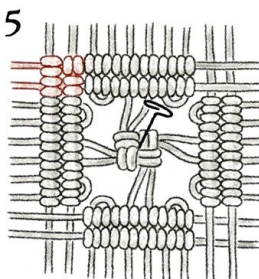
To begin, using 2 cords together as 1, tie a single Round Lanyard knot. Pin the knot to the board. Center 2 B cords across 1 pair of A cords and tie them together using Horizontal Clove Hitches as shown.



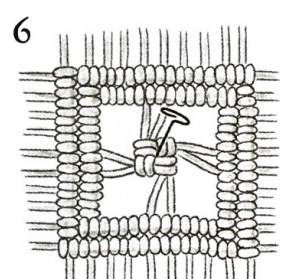
Add 2 B cords to each remaining pair of A cords



Attach the 8 C cords, folding each in half (in pink, next to the A cords).



Finish 1 corner of the square, tying Horizontal Clove Hitches as shown in pink.



Finish the other corners the same way; tighten the knots and arrange into a neat square shape.
