# General in Appeal for Red Cross Fund

AUGUSTA, Ga.—(AP). President Eisenhower appealed to the nation by television and radio Sunday to support the American Red Cross drive for funds and blood donations.

"This year," said the President, "the Red Cross needs \$1 million dollars to do its job. It also must collect five million pints of blood—for the armed services, for civil defense, for civilian sick and injured—and for those most precious civilians of all—our children."

They walked immediately to their automobile, but Mrs. Eisenhower spotted Mrs. Paul T. Carroll, turned, walked over and kissed her. Mrs. Carroll's husband, an Army lieutenant colonel, is the President's liaison man with the Defense Department.

Several pressing problems faced the President as he and Mrs. Eisenhower and members of his White House staff returned to the capital aboard the Presidential plane, the Columbian.

The trip was uneventful. But the 36-degree temperature that greeted Mr. Eisenhower at National Airport was a far cry from the ideal golfing weather he encountered in Georgia.

The first matter on Mr. Eisenhower's busy schedule today is an 8:30 a. m. legislative conference with Republican congressional leaders. At noon, he will entertain 11 Republican and 10 Democratic House members at lunch.

The vital Korean question will be the subject of a White House conference Tuesday. On tap will be Gen. James A. Van Fleet, retiring commander of the Eighth Army in Korea, and Gen. George C. Marshall, former Secretary of Defense.

The group will meet for lunch. Also invited are Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson, other top Pentagon officials, and a group of Senators and representatives. These will include Chairman Leverett Saltonstall (R-Mass.) of the Senate Armed Services Committee, and Sen. Richard B. Russell (D-Ga.), ranking Democrats on the committee.

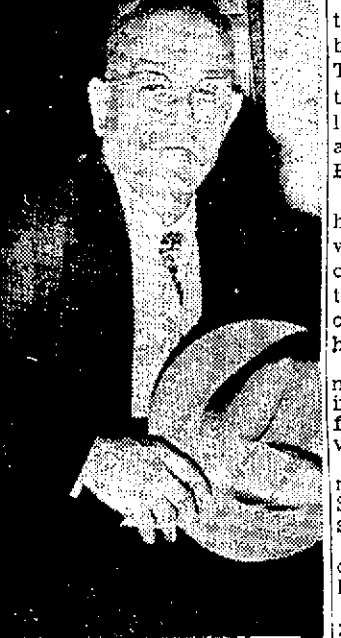

# 60 March Today for Red Cross

In the first en masse solicitation of business firms ever held, 60 women in American Red Cross volunteer uniforms will march into the downtown business district this morning, seeking funds for the 1953 campaign.

Samuel Leddel, chairman of Division 9, and in charge of the downtown solicitation, urged managers of downtown firms to have their checks ready so as to speed the collection, which will be from 10 a. m. to noon.

The quota for gifts from business firms and their employees is 10 per cent higher this year because the Red Cross has promised the American people to collect 2,000,000 extra pints of blood in 1953," Leddel explained.

NEEDS \$7 MILLION  
The Red Cross also must collect an additional \$7,000,000 throughout the nation to process this extra blood into gamma globulin, he said.

"Gamma globulin is a miracle weapon," Leddel said. "It fights paralysis in polio and measles, mumps, scarlet fever and German measles. Out of every dollar we give, seven cents goes to the production of gamma globulin."

WILL LEAVE ENVELOPES

SECRECY BILLS SET  
Assemblyman Frank Luckel (R-San Diego) is the author of the anti-governmental secrecy bills set to be heard this week.

Measures due for consideration by the Municipal and County Government Committee Thursday would ban closed meetings of public bodies and require 24 hour notice of all meetings. The Governmental Efficiency and Economy Committee has on its Wednesday calendar Luckel's measure providing the public records not made private by law shall be open for inspection by the public during business hours.

A comprehensive bill on the subject of closed meetings sponsored by the Assembly's Interim Judiciary Committee has not been set down for a hearing.

# INSIDE OUT HARRY FULTON

ZAFARIA PARK.  
This is the name the City Council recently gave to the new, small park site at the southwest corner of Pacific Coast Hwy. and Redondo Ave., and the wagers that many newcomers, along with some of the "old-timers," have been wondering what the name means and why it was chosen.

Zafaria is a Spanish word meaning small village or ranch house site, and it was first given to a Pacific Electric depot built at Anaheim St. and Obispo Ave. in 1904.

The area adjacent to the depot was settled as early as 1899, with several ranch houses and a general store being built. Later Zafaria community developed, centering on Anaheim St. between Temple and Loma Avenues and extending north of Pacific Coast Hwy. (then State St.) and south to about 11th St.

In 1907, the PE linked Zafaria with Long Beach via its new Redondo Ave. and E. Broadway lines, both of which have since been removed. To popularize the route, a 20-ride roundtrip ticket was offered for \$1 between Zafaria Depot and downtown Long Beach.

Zafaria was annexed to Long Beach in 1909, as a result of a fight over the liquor question. The "drys" forced the annexation election because they wanted to close down a saloon and a winery in Zafaria. Long Beach was "dry" and annexation turned the trick.

In 1920 the name Zafaria was abandoned and, in a community-wide celebration, the area adopted the name East Long Beach.

Their argument will go some thing like this: Russia has started a major political and propaganda offensive to win over the Arab nations and possibly grab off the rich oil fields of Iran, Iraq, Saudi Arabia and Kuwait along with the strategic Suez area.
