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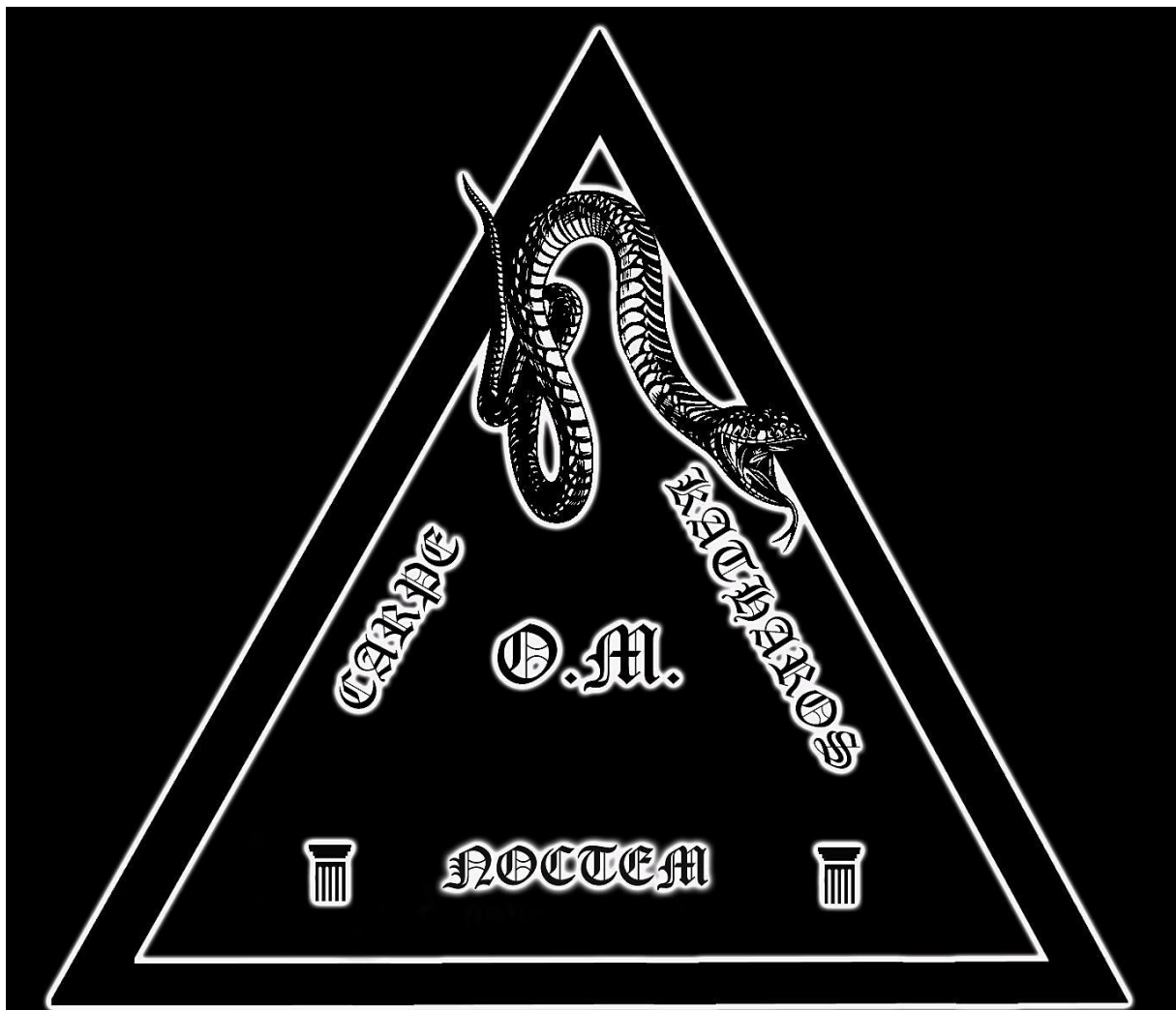


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Original statement of the first edition:

This book will undoubtedly be of great use to researchers, historians, psychologists and occultists both now and in future years and will add to extant literature on the subject.

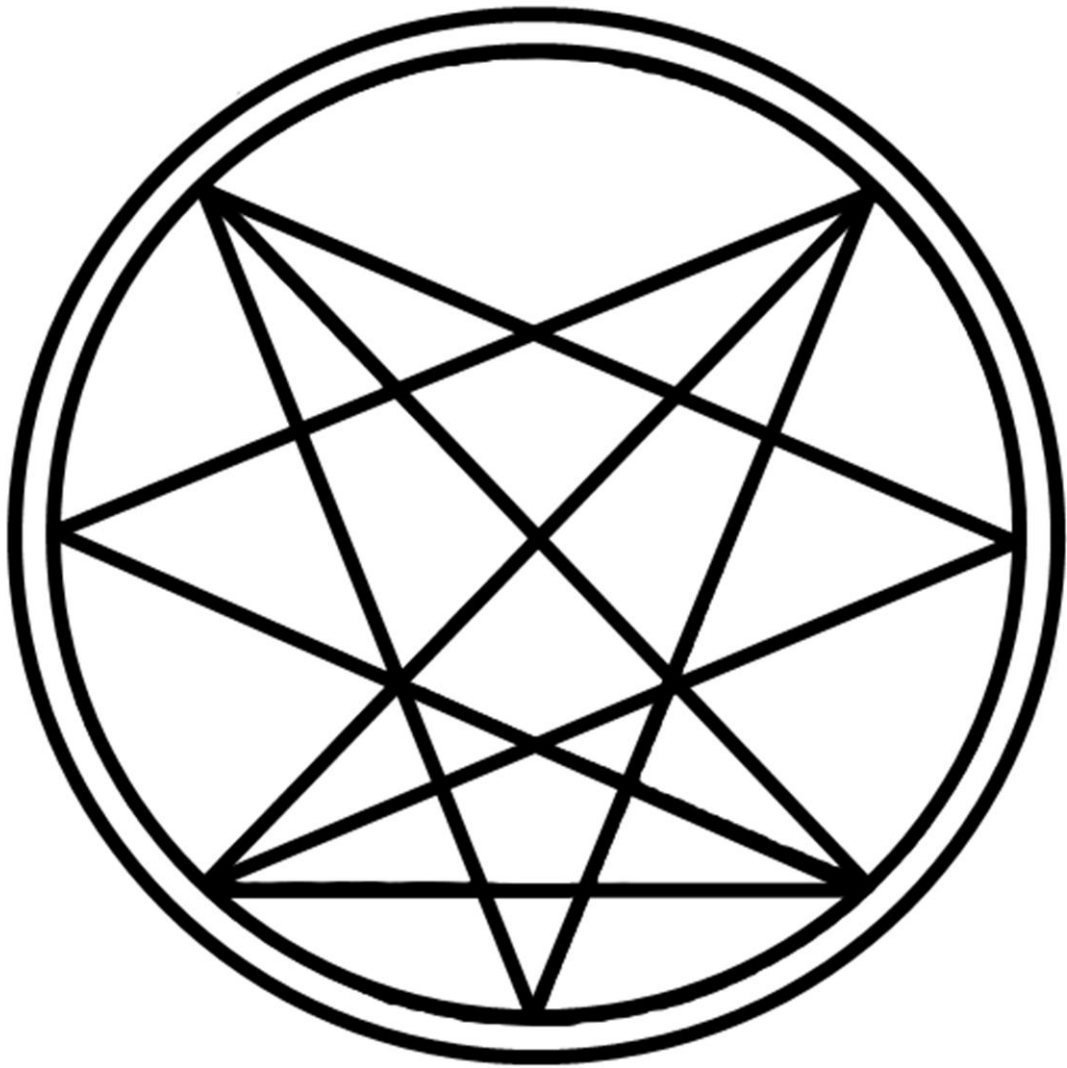

Introduction

The main body of this work (the Rituals, chants, etc.) is taken from the Black Book used by the Temple of the Sun, a Satanist group. The remainder (What is Satanism, Satanist Magickal Grades, etc.) is taken from the instruction texts used by the Temple of the Sun and the Order of Nine Angles.

The only change made – at the request of the Temple of the Sun – is in the substitution, in the chants and some of the texts, of ‘Shaitan’ for ‘Satan’. This is in accord with the current teaching of the Temple.

Frater A’s ‘Hymn to the Great Dawn’ has been included in the section of on chants. Otherwise, the chants are traditional.



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
