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
Amazon Premium Headphones review

Last September, I placed my first Amazon





UNFORTUNATELY, THE YOGURTS WEREN'T ENOUGH FOR ME TO MEET MY \$15 ORDER LIMIT.




I guess they're right. These are pretty good. I used them to listen to Kanye's new track "Saint Pablo" and a few other tracks while I scrambled to recount my adventure this
