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
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Why Camino?

Travel is more than the seeing of sights, it's a multi-sensory discovery.

In that way, eating and drinking your way through destinations comes part and parcel with exploring different cultures. There's nothing like immersing yourself in different regions or districts through local dishes. And South America is no exception.

So for the all around explorers out there, here is the ultimate list of what to order and sample on your travels so you can savour each South American country fully.




Empanadas

There is nothing quite as Chilean as an 'empanada.' Whilst most countries in South America have their own type of pie, the cheese or the spiced meat varieties in Chile are distinctly typical.

Terremoto


Wash it down with a 'terremoto,' a sort of alcoholic type spider made with fermented wine and pineapple ice cream which translates to earthquake (because it's supposed to leave your legs wobbly.)



Wine

And nobody should leave the Chilean borders without sampling the local vino. As a world class exporter of both delicious red and white varieties, you'll be spoilt for choice and won't be disappointed with the local drops.







Chances are on arriving into Peru, you will start to see an intriguing yellow cocktail topped with a whitish froth everywhere you go. This concoction is the beloved 'pisco sour,' a cocktail made of lemon juice, egg whites, bitters, sugar and of course, the local clear spirit, pisco. This tastes a lot better than it sounds which I'm sure you'll agree with after your first!

And as the leader of gastronomy in the continent, it would be criminal to leave Peru without tasting its most famous of dishes, the 'Ceviche.' Fish cooked in lemon juice sounds too simple to be as delicious as it is, but Peruvians have been perfecting this staple for centuries and uniquely pack each one with textures and flavours you won't be expecting.

And although it may surprise you to find alpaca on the menu, carnivores will enjoy sampling it. This protein with a slight gamey flavour has been described as a taste between beef and lamb, is lean with little saturated fat or cholesterol and is rising in popularity worldwide.

Brazil

Caipirinhia

Move over mojitos, the Caipirinhia is a sweeter (and slightly more addictive) summertime drink made of cachaca, an alcohol made from sugar cane. Topped with lime, mint and a bit more sugar, this cocktail is as refreshing as it is rejuvenating. But be warned, this drink is supposed to be sipped slowly, letting the ice melt and add to the flavour over an hour or two.



Manioca Fries

This superb snack made up of the cassava root vegetable is the Brazilian equivalent of french fries and can be found in nearly every bar and restaurant. (Also sometimes referred to as tapioca or yucca.)

Pao de Queijo

This delicious bread and cheese treat is made up of tapioca flour (which is actually gluten free) and sold on nearly every street corner you'll pass in Brazil and may even make it to a breakfast bar or two.





Argentina

Bife de Chorizo

As the meat capital of South America, it would be remiss of you not to indulge your inner carnivore in Argentina. Ask for 'bife de chorizo' for a premium cut of sirloin at a restaurant or simply sample from the assortment that comes with your parilla - a grill platter.

And make sure you top it with some of their sumptuous tomato based salsa ' chimi-churi.'

Malbec

Whilst Argentina competes with Chile when it comes to award winning wine, there is one variety that stands heads and shoulders above - Malbec. This slightly sweet, robust but easy to drink blend is perfect paired with beef.



Alfajor

This delectable dessert, pronounced 'alfa-hawr' is a beautiful biscuit sandwich filled with dulce de leche - that South American caramel dreams are made of.

With a climate close to the equator and home to many cocoa farms, Ecuador is the home of quality chocolate in South America.

Their speciality are the dark varieties and the only tip is to try as many as types as possible.

To luxuriate in the endless rugged beauty you must experience Los Glaciares National Park. home to the enigmatic Perito Moreno Glacier, the most active in the world. There are many light trails you can walk on arrival, all offering incredible views of the north face of the glacier and the surrounding snow capped mountains. Your excursion choices here are many; take a boat ride to experience the south side of the glacier. You may be lucky enough to witness or hear the large shards of ice that break intermittently from the glacier and plunge into the immense lake below.

Or you can head ashore for a short trek through pristine forest and mini-trek your way across the glacier itself for a once in a lifetime experience. Neighbouring glaciers of Upsala and Onelli are also worth a mention and you can cruise for the day to observe the natural kaleidescope of icy colours.

When to visit


The best time to visit El Calafate depends on you and what you would like to experience. During the peak summer months of December to February is a popular time. The average high temperatures are around 20°C. Be prepared for the region's infamous winds however, which can reach over 120 miles an hour. Spring (Sep - Nov) and fall (Mar -May) are slightly cooler, but the winds tend to be less severe, It is good to note May is generally the wettest month.

In winter (Jun-Aug) the minimum average temperature is 1.8°C. Many people consider winter to be one of the most picturesque times of year for a day hike as other trails are generally closed.

Eolo is a luxury estancia (ranch) offering a 5 star authentic immersion the gaucho pastoral life from El Calafate. With only 17 rooms, this is an intimate an experience you can get.



ALL ABOARD THE SACRED TRAIL


Your local porters and their trusty donkeys are your best friends as you attempt the 43 kilometre inca trek through the imposing valleys and mountains of Peru.






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


Today, your inca trail journey starts in the Inca Capital city of Cuzco with a train trip to kilometre 104. The trek itself is 4 days of walking through the elevated and distinct terrain, although many turn this into 5 days by staying a night in Aguas Calientes before the return train journey back.



You will find many inca ruins on the way to enormous citadel, but none as large or as impressive as Machu Picchu itself which is approximately 32 hectares, or more than 35 soccer fields.










The agricultural terraces are an important feature of inca design, using the the sharp slopes of the mountains in the Andes regions and their waterways to create advanced farming and irrigation systems.

THRIVING AND CHANGED COLOMBIA.

Travelling to Colombia feels like merging with an exotic culture. Colombia is like a book filled with open pages of profound history, beautiful fauna and flora, very warm people, fine food and passionate tribes to discover.

It's understandable why some people are scared about travelling there. Most westerners only hear about the country in negative drug cartel new stories or from bingeing 'Narcos.'

The story has positively changed in the last decades of development however, with a stronger Colombia emerging, with opportunities and projects and growth.

Working in the fashion industry, I've had the privilege to experience firsthand cross cultural exchanges between western influencers and their desire for unique tribal designs and sustainable fashion pieces from Colombia.

MY CARTAGENA EXPERIENCE


Cartagena de Indias is one of the most important cities in the northern Caribbean Coast and is split between the older romantic historic parts of the city and the new modern areas. Celebrities and worldwide jet setters have long made this city a stopover and as Cartagena hosts remarkable events such as Miss Universe Colombia, the Cartagena Film Festival and Cartagena Music Festival there are so many reasons why.

The 'Centro' is the hub and home of the city's nightlife hub of town, especially Calle de las Bovedas. A favourite was **Cuba 1940s** whose ambience with a small pool was delightful where you can dip your feet while listening to the live Cuban band, El Tio y Sus Sobrinos until late.

Restaurant La Cocina de Dorotea does a beautiful "Posta Cartagenera," a typical local dish of caramelized beef with coconut rice, fresh salad, guava juice and fish soup.

Other international options such as Peruvian fusion restaurant TERIYAKI and the Colombo- Lebanese Zaitun eatery with with live band are also worth checking out.

Just outside the old town, the **Getsemani** neighbourhood is one of the coolest parts of the city, with its fantastic street art and cobblestone streets.
