About USC Shoah Foundation – The Institute for Visual History and Education

In 1994, after completing the film *Schindler's List*, Steven Spielberg established the Shoah Foundation to collect and preserve video testimonies of survivors and other witnesses of the Holocaust. He envisioned that these accounts could have a profound effect on education, and that the survivors could become teachers of humanity for generations to come.

Today, USC Shoah Foundation has the largest Visual History Archive of its kind in the world. With more than 54,000 testimonies in 41 languages from 62 countries, the Institute has become a world academic leader in the study of genocide and the use of testimony for education. The Institute is working to preserve its collection in perpetuity and has expanded the Archive to include accounts of survivors and witnesses of other genocides.

USC Shoah Foundation's **Armenian Genocide Collection** is the largest archive of filmed interviews of Armenian Genocide survivors and witnesses. Through scholarly research and educational engagement in schools around the world, these testimonies can be a powerful force for understanding, empathy, civic engagement and reconciliation, even in the face of denial and hatred.
