
I hope that everyone is having a great summer. With the temperature rising everyone should stay inside and keep cool.

- E. CME Classes (August 24th) these classes are doing great. I am hearing amazing things about these classes. Plan on attending the CME Classes.



Masonic Trivia

From the book <u>Masonic Trivia: Amusements and Curiosities</u> by Peter Champion

Well-known Masonic author Harold Van Buren Voorhis' fraternal affiliations included memberships in 21 national, 3 state, and 11 local appendant and concordant Masonic bodies. These were in addition to his term as Master of Mystic Brotherhood Lodge #21, of Red Bank, New Jersey, in 1937.

W. Bro. Voorhis had a life-long passion for amateur radio, beginning in 1915 as a charter member of the Radio League of America. His "ham" radio experience gave him years of practice with tape recordings.

He put this experience to good use by recording his own Masonic funeral for both a church service and a graveside service. He also included the rendering of his own prayers.

With a voice from beyond the grave, W. Bro. Voorhis conducted his own funeral service in 1983.

To All Brethren Wherever Dispersed:

I am writing to you today because we need your help. We have all heard about, and many of us contribute to the Shrine Hospitals and Scottish Rite Hospital for children. The Scottish Rite Learning Center of South Texas has been helping children with dyslexia since 1985. Dyslexia is a learning disability that makes it difficult for children to decode letters and numbers. It is a neurological "glitch" that is never out-grown. It can affect a child's ability to read and write, and can ultimately lead to low self-esteem and feelings of failure. The good news is that the Scottish Rite Hospital has developed a curriculum that has proven very successful in helping children to overcome this disability. The classes are provided at no charge to the families and are funded by Brethren like yourselves, who want to provide these kids with an opportunity for success. Our curriculum has been recognized as the most effective way to teach kids how to overcome this disability, and School Districts across the State are sending educators to learn our program for use in their own Special Education Departments.

But again, we need your help. For the last 3 years our Center has operated at a loss. <u>Please</u> help us to continue providing this essential resource to the children and families of South -Central Texas. Whatever your Lodge, or you as individuals can afford to donate would be very much appreciated. The Learning Center is a tax-exempt 501c3 charitable organization and your donations are tax-deductible.

LIGHT REFLECTIONS



An "Opinion" offered by Brother Bradley Kohanke, PM

It's been a little over a year since my last article, and reading through some of the old ones reminded me how much I enjoyed sharing some of the things I've experienced in my Masonic journey or some of the topics that have interested me during my studies. Over the next several months, I'd like to focus on the latter. Those of you that know me, know that I have a passion for religious and philosophical studies. This passion has resulted in a lot of benefits, burdens, and banalities. For instance, on July 9, 2010, I received my Credentials of Ministry and was Ordained as a Unitarian Minister. I am still very interested in these topics and am pursuing graduate studies in Comparative Religion and Philosophy. I tell you these things only because I want you to understand that through these studies, I have been exposed to a large number of religious and/or philosophical schools of thought. I want to share some of my observations with you, but I want to stress the fact that these are merely my observations. Although I may have drawn some of my own conclusions on a few of these topics, I will not try persuade you in any way, shape, or form. I will present these observations in an objective to influence or manner and allow you to draw your own conclusions...or not. Also, given the limited length of my article, the information I present will be a very abridged representation of any given topic, and will primarily focus on things that may sound familiar or appear similar to our own Masonic rituals and practices. If one of them interests you, I encourage you to do your own reading and research in order to further your knowledge and understanding.

Ok, with that HUGE disclaimer out of the way, this month I'd like to share some aspects of Mithraism or the Mithraic Mystery School of ancient Rome that I found very interesting. The Roman version of the worship of Mithras is said to have begun anywhere between the 1st century BC and the 1st century AD. There are some that claim its teachings go as far back as 1,400 BC, to the Persian or Indo-Iranian god Mitra or Mithra. However, I have seen very little information on this old religion that relates to the Romanized version. In many books and essays on Mithra, it is claimed that his birthday was December 25th, and since the religion was a contemporary of early Christianity, many people point to this as evidence of cross-pollination between the two worship systems. However, it seems much more likely that followers of Mithra (along with most other followers of the Pagan religions of the time), celebrated a very important feast day on or around December 25th. This was a celebration or festival of the sun, and corresponded with the increasing length of days, or the winter solstice. The followers of Mithras also appear to have celebrated a feast day on June 26, near the summer solstice, to celebrate the sun when daylight was at its longest. It is interesting to note the proximity of the dates to the feast days of the Saints John (December 27th and June 24th).

Meeting places for the Mithraic Mystery School were called Mithraeum. These were relatively simple compared to the grand temples of other Pagan religions, and would accommodate only 30-40 members. Most Mithraeum were underground and were all constructed after the same pattern. The room was rectangular in shape and had no windows. Entrance was made through an ante-room at the west side, and a statue or representation of situated at the far east end with an altar in front of it. The room was lined on either side (north and south) with seating for the members and it had a vaulted ceiling. Feasting during the meetings seemed to be a regular occurrence because archeologists have discovered food remains in the Mithraeum that are still being excavated today. Estimates put the number of Mithraeum within the city of Rome itself close to 700. Additional small rooms near the entrance appear to have served as food preparation rooms, and perhaps candidate preparation rooms as well. For the most part, this was an orally transmitted school of instruction and very little of the actual written practices remain, however enough remains to get a general idea. Membership in the Mystery School was limited to males only, and each Mithraic initiate had to swear an oath of secrecy. Progression in the mysteries was done though initiation into various degrees of learning. There was a total of 7 Degrees, the first 4 of which were for the general membership, with the final 3 being for those who progressed into positions of authority. Each Degree had an initiation rite, a required memorization of questions and answers pertaining to that symbols representing each level. The Degrees and corresponding symbols were: initiation rite, and

1st Degree – Corax (raven or crow) Symbols – beaker, caduceus (snake on staff)

2nd Degree – Nymphobus (bridegroom) Symbols – lamp, bell, veil

3rd Degree – Miles (soldier) Symbols – helmet, lance, drum, belt

4th Degree – Leo (lion) Symbols – laurel wreath, thunderbolts, spade

5th Degree – Perses (Persian) Symbols – Phrygian cap, sickle, crescent moon

6th Degree – Heliodromus (sun-runner) Symbols – torch, sun, whip

7th Degree – Pater (father) Symbols – shepherd staff, Persian cap, sword

The 7th Degree was reserved for the leader of the group, who was referred to as Pater (or Father) during the meetings. From the inscriptions left on cups and pottery from the time, it appears that each of these initiation ceremonies involved the re-enactment of one of the episodes in the life of Mithras, and carried with it certain moral lessons that were explained to the initiate at the time. The Lion Degree seems to have been the pinnacle Degree for the general membership, and those initiated into this Degree had to adhere to a very strict moral and ethical code. Once a man had attained this level, he and his fellow Lions referred to themselves as "Syndexioi," which translates as "those united by the handshake." Images of Mithras are still being found throughout the old Roman Empire, and there are 4 representations; birth from a rock, killing the sacred bull of heaven, feasting with Sol Invictus, and the lion-headed figure of the adept – Leo. Two of these are pictured here simply because of their similarity to our ashlars and the Lion of the Tribe of Judah.



If you decide to investigate Mithraism further, you will no doubt uncover other similarities to Freemasonry, however you will find much more that is unfamiliar. Again, I am only trying to stimulate your interest in these topics

Freemason Wisdom: Joseph Fort Newtown

"But the real Home of the Soul cannot be built of brick and stone; it is a house not made with hands. Slowly it rises, fashioned of the thoughts, hopes, prayers, dreams, and righteous acts of devout and free men; built of their hunger for truth, their love of God, and their loyalty to one another."

~Joseph Fort Newton (1880 -1950)

There are few Masonic writers whose work has stood the test of time as well as R. W. Brother the Reverend Doctor Joseph Fort Newton, 33°. His best known volume "The Builders" is still considered required reading for any Mason interested in learning more about Freemasonry. It was amongst the first books I read on the subject. I recently acquired a 1951 reprint of that book, and there was an interesting story about one of Newton's early childhood memories and one of his first contacts with the Brethren of a Masonic Lodge.

He was at his father's funeral as a boy, and he remembered the Masons were there to do the last rites. The Master in his tall hat, and the Brethren standing in a square around the grave, each wearing white aprons. Each of them dropped a sprig of evergreen into the open grave as they walked past. He learned that his father had served as Master of that Lodge of Masons.

And there was another interesting story he learned about his father. His father had served in the Confederate Army during the Civil War. His life had been saved by a Union Officer, a Freemason, who recognized him to be a Freemason as well. Both of those impressions stuck with young Joseph, and years later in 1902, he was raised in Friendship Lodge No. 7 in Dixon, Illinois.

We've all heard stories like that before. It reminds us that what we do each day doesn't always have an immediate impact. When we attend a Masonic Funeral Rite, that impression of what we do may very well stick with some member of that Mason's family and may one day lead him to a Masonic Lodge. That Union Officer was just doing the right thing, and he had no idea that the son of the Mason he saved would one day be prompted to join a Lodge, possibly, in part because of that story of his kindness in a time of war, and would become an influential and respected voice in Freemasonry.

It's often not the big things we do in life that have the greatest impact. Sometimes, it's those small incidental things that we don't even give great consideration to that hold the power to change the course of a life . . . and as a result, add a little more light to the world.

A History of the San Antonio Scottish Rite Bodies to 1967

Formation of the Consistory: 1916

In October, 1915, the Supreme Council at Washington, D. C., granted a permanent charter to Travis Council of Kadosh, and at the same time granted the San Antonio brethren Letters Temporary for the institution of a Consistory with full power to confer the thirty-first and thirty-second degrees.

On Saturday, February 12, 1916, Inspector General Cochran again visited San Antonio; this time it was for the dual purpose of presenting to the Council its permanent charter and constituting it and its officers under the same; and at the same time instituting San Antonio Consistory and setting it to work.

Both ceremonies were held in the afternoon, with the ceremonies of the Council taking place at two o'clock, and those of the Consistory taking place at five o'clock. A large group of fraternal delegates from other Councils over the State were present at the Council ceremonies and acted as provisional officers in setting up the permanent organization.

The ceremonies of the afternoon were concluded by the Inspector General reading an Allocution, written by the late Albert Pike, which was in the nature of a charge to the new officers. The ceremonies instituting the Consistory were likewise attended by a number of fraternal delegates from the other Consistories of the State who assisted as provisional officers.

The Inspector General, after his opening address, announced the appointment of Jewel P. Lightfoot, 33°, of Austin as Grand Marshal of Ceremonies. The following brethren, who had previously been chosen to be the first officers of the Consistory, were then introduced and inducted into their respective offices:

PARDUE, 32°, Prelate FRED A BURNS, 32°, Marshal of Ceremonies FRANK NEWTON, 32° K.C.C.H., Ass. Exp .NORMAN MACLEOD, 32°, Capt. of the Guards STEPHEN GOULD, 32°, K.C.C.H., Tiler William Ward Boyce, 32° K.C.C.H., of Runge, Texas, who had been chosen Expert, was absent on account of illness and was inducted later.


There was no withholding of emotions on the day the Consistory was instituted. The San

Antonio Express in an article on February 12, 1916, made the statement that "establishing the Consistory in San Antonio places the Bodies in this city on an equal footing with other Scottish Rite Centers of Texas." A few days later, on February 25, 1916, Nat M. Washer (Nathan Moses Washer), 33°, stated: "Through years of patient waiting, with hope to cheer, necessity to stimulate and courage to dare, have we labored earnestly and prayed sincerely for the arrival of this good hour, oftentimes with the feeling that we stood even as Moses did upon Mount Nebo, glimpsing the promised goal with only a distant and uncertain hope of enjoying its full fruition. Today however, victory has perched upon our banner, and, like the Psalmist of old, we can be glad and rejoice for "our cup of happiness is full, yea it runneth over." The measure of joy in this consummation is intensified by the knowledge of possible achievement, for here in this Valley time and opportunity are pregnant with great results because of the influence for good which our beloved Rite must and shall exert in the prolific field which lies about us. Our labors have only begun, but fired with enthusiasm for the cause, and thoroughly imbued with the spirit of the Rite we will mount to the summit peak of accomplishment, for, exalting men to the dignity of .. Master of the Royal Secret," we shall raise and improve the standards of citizenship as we bring them to a better understanding of reverent devotion to Deity, unselfish attachment to fellow-man and patriotic duty to free and popular government as it exists to-day in our beloved country and to the continuance of which as loyal Americans, we are unalterably and irrevocably pledged"...Nat M. Washer, 33°, has been quoted frequently in this history for the reason that he was gifted both in speech and writing, and his articles and comments on early Scottish Rite Masonry in San Antonio are available today. 
"It was a pleasure serving the lodge in the capacity of Junior Warden this past Masonic year. I have learned a great deal during this term, and look forward to continuing to serve the lodge and our community. As this year comes to an end, thus our journey through the various religions and their respective virtues comes to a close. If you followed my articles throughout this year you may have asked the question "what does this have to do with Masonry?"; well brethren, I am about to wrap up a very long and drawn out point to which I urge you to deeply consider. At the beginning of the year I wrote about various systems of morals in which I argued that our system of morals was one concerning virtues, of which we subscribe to four: temperance, fortitude, prudence and justice. Without rehashing that entire article, a moral system based on virtues is solely interested in the development of an individual which is in contrast to most of the other moral systems that are seemingly more interested in the development of society and "the greatest good" for such. In virtue based moral systems there is a consistency in what is moral and immoral whereas in other systems based on "the greater good" of society argument, morals change with the ebb and flow of emotions (and profits). To illustrate this point we have all seen the "norms" within society change from time to time, what is right today could be wrong tomorrow, and the other way around. Moral virtues prepare an individual to be a self-governing, self-responsible member of society (to act with virtue), while the latter would prepare an individual to be governed by the emotional dictates of an ever-changing society. One creates independence while the other creates dependency. Throughout the last year we journeyed through many religions exploring the virtues within to show that all the religions teach individual virtues. It can therefore be surmised that religions, in their most basic form, inherently subscribe to the theory of moral virtue. That they hold the development of individual moral character in the highest esteem is very clear. Additionally, if you followed the articles, no matter what religion is being covered it echoed, or expanded on the virtues of the last. It quickly became apparent that, although differing in their respective dogma, every religion teaches and holds sacred the same moral laws and principles. The question then arises, if that's the case, why is our society or for that matter, the world, seemingly spinning out of control. Seems pretty clear, at least to me, that mankind is the problem at least in the sense that individual interpretation, which inherently carries with it personal agenda, and the perpetuation of dogma, usually devoid of natural moral laws, is the ultimate problem. The moral virtues taught within each and EVERY religion serves the purpose to develop an individual with moral virtue, and to prepare each to act according to the ultimate virtue of the golden rule. As the saying goes, "Masonry is not a religion, but a society of religious men", joined together in universal brotherhood for the betterment of society and each other. To accomplish this, I would argue, Masonry employs a system of morals which subscribes to virtues, not just any virtues, but the most practical ones found in common with every religion which allows us to dwell together in unity despite our diversity. Hold fast to the virtues within your chosen religion, disregard the dogma, extremism, and the lackadaisical attitudes in practices we all see within each, and allow the light to shine in allowing us to see we are all not so different after all. Practice those most sacred virtues taught to you as an Entered Apprentice, no matter how much knowledge you may obtain never stray from the basics. Maybe then we can all live up to the greatest virtue of all, to do unto others as we wish done unto ourselves.

CONSIDERED READING



Freemasonry has never lacked for detractors. Enemies of the organization have included the Roman Catholic Church, the Communist Party, and the Nazis. It has been denounced by popes and kings, by the ignorant and by those who felt threatened by the fraternity's reputation for secrecy. Unfortunately, because it has a long history of never answering critics, Freemasonry makes a wonderful target for bigotry. Now, a group of religious fundamentalists has managed, after years of struggle, to take a controlling position in the largest Protestant denomination in the United States. It has launched what is potentially the most damaging assault on Masonry in the past century. In A Pilgrim's Path John J. Robinson relates the history of the attacks against the organization and the motives behind the attacks. In doing so he discusses the origins of Freemasonry, its tenets, and its goals. Then he takes on the anti-Masonic evangelists who currently seek to destroy Freemasonry. Defusing and refuting fabrications and misstatements of Pat Robertson, Jerry Falwell, and Dr. James Holly, Robinson makes an eloquent plea for an end to their kind of hatred.

Unlike most of its five million members, including many world leaders, who believe that the Freemasons, the world's largest fraternal organization, evolved from the guilds of medieval stonemasons, historian Robinson persuasively links Freemasonry's origins and goals to the once powerful and wealthy Knights Templar order. Banned and persecuted by a 14th-century papal bull, he claims, the Knights were forced to form an underground society. The author combines scholarly research and entertaining storytelling in tracing Freemasonry as a worldwide political, religious, economic and social body dedicated to self-improvement and charity while governed by secret rituals and symbols (explained here in detail).
