

Tales of Buried Treasure from CFMDC

The Central Florida Metal Detecting Club located in Sanford, FL was contacted by a couple asking for help to find a cache of silver bars they buried 36 years before. Since 2005, the couple, John and Martha, had been trying to find the cache. They went to the corner of the house and started digging to recover the silver, but they couldn't find it. Off and on for the next *three years* the owner would dig deep holes under his house wall and slab. At one time his trench was over 12'. Eventually, a friend of his tried using a metal detector to recover the cache, but the steel rebar in the wall and slab kept making the detector go crazy with its chattering each time they got near the house wall and concrete slab.

John began blaming himself, thinking his mind was playing tricks on him. After all, the silver had been buried for 36 years! He could have sworn it was under the corner slab of the house. They traveled a lot in those early days and were often gone. Had someone dug it up while they were traveling? He needed to know and reached out to the CFMDC for assistance.

Roland (Rolo) Davis of CFMDC agreed to help the couple. Using a Minelab Explorer XS with a 7" coil and a Sun Ray target pinpointer, Rolo and Digger, his Jack Russell Terrier, immediately got to work. After many hours of digging, the hole was 4 feet deep and 8 ft long – but there was no signal. He even used a 5 foot steel probe with no success. The wife arrived and said it was further away from the house. Then Rolo spent time probing every 6 inches from the wall of the house. On his third pass along the twelve-foot section of the wall and 4 feet away from the house he hit a solid mass buried at a depth of 4 feet. Finally, after digging a shallow hole, he got a faint signal from his detector. Using a shovel, Rolo proceeded to recover 84 - 10 troy oz bars, valued at \$18.160.00!

Rolo was rewarded with a pizza for lunch and two of the silver bars. He was also given permission to hunt the 1944 house site. Way to go, Rolo!

JASON'S TIP

The Truth about Pirates is...

ne of the many myths that rattle around in avid readers' cages is the one that conjures up a vision of pirates digging a hole in the beach, probably twelve paces from a rock or old oak tree, then burying a chest of gold, silver, and jewels. Appropriately, the diggers are promptly shot, or beheaded, and their bodies thrown upon the chest and the hole filled in with sand. The dead diggers would guard the treasure until the pirates returned. How many times have we seen this in old Errol Flynn movies? Well, for the record, very few —if any—chests of treasure were ever buried by pirates. That includes Blackbeard, Billy Bowlegs, Anne Bonny, and any other famous cutthroats you have read about.

Truth is, as soon as the "buccaneers" captured a few ships (and not all of them had treasure on board) they would head for the nearest port and splurge it on wicked, wicked women, rum, and other necessities of life. I doubt if that included a hot bath. As soon as they ran out of money...it was off to sea again. They really never had time to bury any money, and of course, they never trusted anyone, even their blood brothers, to keep it a secret where their loot had been buried. The pirates stood a good chance of never being able to return to the "deserted island" where the chest was buried twelve paces from the old oak tree. So when a stranger on the street corner offers to sell you a "pirate treasure map", sell him the Brooklyn Bridge instead.

I should better describe "pirates" as such, I've been accused of being one many times. Pirates were actually out-of-work sailors, and they banded together like the mafia because there was strength in numbers. They chose a leader, another out-of-work sailor that had a bit of a knack for leadership, and called him "captain". If they didn't agree with where he wanted to go, or if he wasn't aggressive enough, they chose another leader. I don't think they made the old leader walk the plank, unless he was a Green Bay cheesehead. One of the largest sources, or pools, of out-of-work sailors occurred around 1713 when the British discharged 35,000 sailors. Queen Ann's War was over, and Old England just couldn't afford to have them on the payroll. So all of a sudden here were a bunch of

sailors that had to make a living, and the only thing they knew how to do was sail ships, fire cannons, board ships with boarding cutlasses, and put up with scurvy. The "Golden Age of Piracy" was born.

The law among pirates was simple, "No prey, no pay". So after the business at hand was taken care of —the capture of a wealthy merchant ship—the division of loot went something like this: The captain, or leader, usually got five or six shares, the chief bos'n two shares. The carpenter, or shipwright, who careened, mended, and rigged the ship usually got 100 to 150 pieces-of-eight. For future provisions and victualling they set aside 200 pieces-of-eight. The surgeon usually got 200 to 250 pieces-of-eight.

One of the cardinal rules was that a pirate injured in battle would be adequately taken care of. So, if he lost his right arm he got 600 pieces-of-eight(or six slaves), for a left arm only 500 pieces-of-eight. For a right leg 500 pieces-of-eight (or five slaves), and for a left leg 400 pieces-of-eight. Yes, pirates DID have wooden legs. For the loss of an eye, 100 pieces-of-eight (or one slave), and the same 100 pieces-of-eight for the loss of a finger or hand.

Often, if the ship they captured was better rigged, or cleaner than their own, they transferred to the other ship and burned the old one.

How about parrots, did they REALLY have parrots perched on their shoulder, singing bawdy songs or swearing in a seamanlike manner? The answer is YES, they did take a liking to parrots, because they didn't eat much, they drank less water than a dog (unless rum was available), and they could talk up a storm and keep everyone amused.

How about walking the plank? I don't think so! It was too easy to just hack the enemy's head off and toss him to the sharks. They did "keel haul" an occasional captive in an effort to make him talk and tell where the treasure was hidden aboard ship. (*Then* they killed him.) A pirate saying, "cat in the pan", meant someone that "changed sides", or changed stories to suit the occasion.

Enough for now harpies, sing a song, drink a bit of rum or wine, and we'll tell you more about the Spanish Main on our next cruise through the Lily Pad.



comfort to Bob's family and friends who were so clearly the greatest treasures in his life.













